

2019 FOMA Mid-Year Seminar Speaker Biographies (Updated: 8/29/2019)

Michael J. Donnelly, MD, FACP, FAAP, is the academic chair and chief of service for the Department of Pediatrics for Georgetown University's School of Medicine and MedStar Georgetown University Hospital respectively. In addition, Dr. Donnelly now holds the University's Philip L. Calcagno, MD and Jeane and James Dixon Endowed Chair in Pediatrics. Dr. Donnelly is a Med-Peds physician, a specialty in which doctors are board certified in both internal medicine and pediatrics. He is both a professor of medicine and pediatrics and sees patients at MedStar Georgetown University Hospital. In addition to providing primary care to patients of all ages, Dr. Donnelly is actively involved in medical education. At Georgetown University School of Medicine, he instructs students in the pediatrics third year clerkship, and for 10 years prior to becoming interim chair, he directed the physical diagnosis course for first and second year students. He also served as associate program director of the Combined Internal Medicine-Pediatrics Residency at MedStar Georgetown University Hospital for 12 years. Dr. Donnelly was vice chair of the Department of Medicine for four years prior to becoming acting chair in Pediatrics. His commitment to education has been recognized over the years. In 2012, he received a Golden Apple Award. In 2014 and in 2015, he received The Doctoring Award, and in 2015, he received a Kaiser-Permanente Award for teaching. At the national level, Dr. Donnelly has been active in the Med-Peds Program Directors Association Recruiting Committee and as a faculty advisor to the National Med-Peds Residents Association. For the past two years, he has served as the Chair of the American Academy of Pediatrics- Section on Med-Peds Executive Committee, the largest Med-Peds physicians organization in the U.S. He also Co-chairs a Test Material Development Committee for the National Board of Medical Examiners. Dr. Donnelly received a bachelor's degree in biomedical engineering from Duke University, and his medical degree from UMDNJ- Robert Wood Johnson Medical School. He did his combined internal medicine-pediatrics training at Mount Sinai Hospital in New York City. Upon completion of his residency, Dr. Donnelly worked at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston for a year then moved to Georgetown. A board certified internist and pediatrician, he is a fellow of both the American Academy of Pediatrics and the American College of Physicians.

Gail J. Dudley, DO, CHCQM, FABQAURP, MHA, FACOFP is a 1986 graduate of West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine. Dr. Dudley is board certified in Family Practice, OMM/NMM, and Hospice and is a diplomate and fellow of ABQAURP. As a primary care physician, she referred patients to hospice and remained as their attending physician, as well as making house calls to those patients. Dr. Dudley later worked full time in hospice and continues to work part time for a local hospice. For the past 30+ years, she has been involved in all sorts of case review, finding fraud and abuse in medicine and hospice. Over the years, Dr. Dudley has been involved in the politics of medicine in several arenas, including serving as an FOMA trustee and Director at Large.

Maurice T. Edwards, has been employed with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office in Seminole County, Florida since 2006. He is assigned to the Youth Intervention Services Unit. His responsibilities include the investigation of missing juveniles and human trafficking cases. Investigator Edwards is also a Task Force Officer with the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI), assigned to the Innocent Images Task Force for human trafficking cases. Investigator Edwards works with local, state and federal agencies in pursuit of the most comprehensive response and investigation to the crime of human trafficking. Investigator Edwards was the lead investigator in the first human trafficking case investigated, tried and successfully prosecuted in Seminole County. This case was a major success in Seminole County, both for law enforcement and for the prosecutor's office. Investigator Edwards is currently the Chairman for the Seminole County Human Trafficking Task Force. He leads the task force in connecting law enforcement, prosecutors and various agencies and organizations in working together to recognize human trafficking and respond effectively. The task force also provides a wide range of services to victims of human trafficking. Investigator Edwards has received the 2018 Polaris Star Award for Law Enforcement Investigation in

human trafficking, the 2018 Florida Intelligence Law Enforcement Officer of the Year for human trafficking, and the 2018 Certificate of Excellence awarded by Governor Rick Scott for combatting human trafficking. Investigator Edwards routinely travels throughout the state of Florida to educate and provide resources to law enforcement and civilians in order to combat human trafficking.

Walter B. Flesner, III, DO, received his DO degree from the Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine. He completed his rotating internship at Southeastern Medical Center in North Miami Beach, Florida. Dr. Flesner is board certified in Family Practice. He served as President of the FOMA from 1996-97 and has served as Doctor of the Day during the Florida Legislature each year since 1995. He currently has serves as a FOMA Trustee, AOA Delegate, Parliamentarian and has served as Chair of the FOMA Nominating Committee and Constitution & Bylaws Committee. Locally, Dr. Flesner has been extremely active in FOMA District Society 11 (Southwest District Society). He has been a member since 2006, President from 2008-2010 and currently serves as Program Director for FOMA District Society 11's Sanibel Seminar. In 2019, Dr. Flesner received the FOMA Lifetime Achievement Award. This award is given to an osteopathic physician who, during the past year, has made significant and considerable contributions not only to the osteopathic profession, but also to the community on both a local and statewide level.

Marie Florent-Carre, DO, MPH, is assistant professor of Family Medicine and Public Health at Nova Southeastern University Dr. Kiran Patel College of Osteopathic Medicine (NSU-KPCOM), is the Chair of the Department of Rural and Urban Underserved Medicine. She completed a Health Policy Fellowship, certified by the American Association of Colleges of Osteopathic Medicine (AACOM) and Ohio Heritage College of Osteopathic Medicine. She has been actively involved in research, was previously co-investigator of a study on adherence in older adults with multiple chronic conditions (2015), and principle investigator of a grant co-sponsored by Broward Regional Health Planning Council (BRHPC) for the Transforming Our Community's Health (TOUCH) project (2015-2016). Dr. Florent-Carre obtained her Bachelor of Science degree in Nutrition at the University of Florida in 1994. She earned a Master of Public Health degree from Florida International University in 1999, and her Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine degree at NSU-COM in 2005. Following her training, she worked as a Ryan White provider at the Broward Community and Family Health Centers in Broward County, and subsequently obtained her certification as an HIV specialist by the American Academy of HIV Medicine. She continued to provide HIV care at C.L. Brumback clinic in Belle Glade, where she served a rural population for several years. She has participated in multiple international outreach trips including Jamaica, Haiti and Ecuador, where she had an opportunity to provide medical care to various rural settings with limited resources. She was a speaker on population health at the 10th Annual Hospital Healthcare Summit in June 2016. She has been a spokesperson on the Zika virus infection and has appeared on multiple panels attended by healthcare professionals and public officials, including representatives from the CDC. Dr. Florent-Carre appeared on Dateline Health in July 2016 hosted by Dr. Lipmann on the spread of the Zika virus and its risks. She also appeared on PBS television show Viewpoint in November 2016 as part of a panel discussing Public Health Emergencies. She has had multiple other media interviews, including the Sun-Sentinel, and the Miami Herald. She has received multiple awards in the past few years, namely Outstanding Mentor award from Lakeside Medical Center in Belle Glade in 2011, a Leadership award from International Health Initiatives Inc. in 2014, and selected as one of the top Black educators of South Florida by Legacy magazine in 2016. County Commissioner of Miami Dade County (District 6), Rebeca Sousa, joined *Legacy* in thanking Dr. Florent-Carre for her "outstanding leadership and contributions to the community". She received a Community Service award from NSU-KPCOM and a Caring Soul award from International Health Initiatives, Inc. in 2018. Dr. Florent-Carre continues to be committed to providing healthcare to the underserved populations, as well as training medical students and residents to become the future leaders of the communities most in need.

Alan S. Gassman, Esquire, is the founder of the Clearwater, Florida law firm of Gassman, Crotty, and Denicolo, P.A., focusing on the representation of height net worth families, physicians and business owners, and their companies in estate planning, taxation, and business and personal asset structuring. Anna Hayden, DO, is a graduate of the University of Health Sciences in Kansas City, Missouri. She completed her internship at Humana Hospital Palm Beaches and her residency at Nova Southeastern University College of Osteopathic Medicine (NOVA-COM). She is board certified by Family Practice and is credentialed by the American Academy of HIV Medicine as an HIV specialist. Dr. Hayden was appointed to the Florida Board of Osteopathic Medicine in 2010, served as Chair and is still a member. She is a former president of the Florida Osteopathic Medical Association (FOMA), served as a trustee for the FOMA, district society six and as a delegate to the American Osteopathic Association (AOA). In 1996, she was the first-female president of the Broward County Osteopathic Medical Association and remains active on their Board of Governors. Currently, she is President of the National Board of Osteopathic Medical Examiners (NBOME). Dr. Hayden has been caring for the community of downtown Ft. Lauderdale for more than 20 years at Broward Health Specialty Care Center.

David Joyce, DO, earned his DO degree from Medicine at Western University of Health Sciences in 2015. There he served as the chief pre-doctoral teaching fellow in his last year. He is currently a resident physician at Larkin Community Hospital in South Miami, completing his residency program in Family Medicine and Neuromusculoskeletal Medicine.

Marc Kaprow, DO, FACOI, received his undergraduate degree from the University of South Florida in 1992, and his Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine degree from Nova Southeastern University in 2001. During his time at Nova Southeastern, Dr. Kaprow completed pre-doctoral fellowships in both Anatomy and Osteopathic Practices and Principles. Dr. Kaprow completed his Internal Medicine residency at POH Medical Center, an affiliate training site of Michigan State University College of Osteopathic Medicine, in 2004. In 2008 he was appointed Medical Director of Memorial Home Health Care, and in 2010 Dr. Kaprow transitioned his practice from patient care to administration as the

Associate Medical Director for VITAS Hospice in Broward County. In 2012, Dr. Kaprow joined UnitedHealthcare of Florida as a Medical Director of the Florida Medicaid Long Term Care program, overseeing care for nearly 20,000 frail and elderly Floridians. In 2018 Dr. Kaprow relocated to the Orlando area as a Hospice and Palliative Medicine specialist working for Vitas Healthcare. Dr. Kaprow is a Clinical Associate Professor of Internal Medicine at Nova Southeastern University and an Associate Professor of Internal Medicine at the University of Central Florida College of Medicine. He has served as President of the Broward County Osteopathic Medical Association, he has been a FOMA Trustee since 2009 and currently serves as FOMA First Vice President. He has served several FOMA Statewide committees as a delegate to the American Osteopathic Association. Dr. Kaprow also has served on the American College of Osteopathic Internists Practice Management and Professional Development Committee. In 2015, he became an AOA National Health Policy Fellow. Dr. Kaprow has authored several professional publications and has lectured nationally on Palliative Medicine topics and Practice Management. He is married with three daughters.

Dr. Leiber focuses on Interventional Regenerative Orthopedics and is honored to have been the first Regenexx Provider in Florida starting in 2012 – offering the nation’s most advanced non-surgical stem cell and platelet treatments (PRP) for injuries and arthritis under image guidance utilizing ultrasound and fluoroscopy (Xray). He is a program director and instructor for the Not-For-Profit Interventional Orthopedic Foundation (IOF) and acting chair for their curriculum review committee. He was the lead consultant to surgeons and interventionalists at a large Brazilian healthcare network as they began clinical trials in stem cell and PRP treatments.
